










Dudley SEND Strategy: Key points

SEND Strategy 2021-2024

- We have revised the current SEND Strategy with an innovative and ambitious three year strategy for Dudley from 2021-2024.
- Children and families are at the heart of the strategy and it covers the 0-25-year age range and will align closely with the early help strategy and the preparing for adulthood strategy.
- We set up a robust governance structure in order to provide oversight of the process, approval of the revised strategy and co-ordination of its sign off and launch. At the heart of this was the SEND strategy governance group which had representatives from partners, parents/carers and other stakeholders.









SEND Strategy 2021-2024

- Co-production has been at the heart of the strategy development
- Representatives from the Parent Carer
 Forum (PCF), health, social care, early years
 providers, schools, post 16 providers and
 other stakeholders were asked to join four
 themed working groups which developed
 the strategy content.

Four themed working groups

The four themes were focused on:

- Improving Joint Commissioning and engagement arrangements
- Improving the quality of EHCPs and related processes
- Improving the SEND support offer made by Dudley's schools
- Developing specialist provision and related approaches
- Each group was tasked with examining a theme, identifying opportunities to develop arrangements around the theme and reporting back to the governance group with a set of proposals.










Pupil voice

- Pupil voice is central to the SEND Strategy
- Research was undertaken by Dudley Educational Psychology Service, to gain pupil's views about "inclusion" within imaginary school settings.
- These views informed the SEND
 Strategy and contributed to Dudley's
 Education Inclusion Charter.











SEND Strategy Vision and Key Principles

We are committing to the principles that:

- We will always have our SEND children and young people at the heart of all our improvements.
- SEND Improvements are a Dudley Partnership wide responsibility.
- Co-Production is the default start position for all initiatives.
- We will have in place a skilled, motivated and effective SEND Team at the council.
- We will ensure that we have accurate and timely data on which to base effective decisions.
- We will increase the quality and effectiveness of our SEND Support Offer.
- We will increase the number of our SEND children and young people within mainstream settings.
- We will ensure all SEND Improvements are incorporated into our everyday operations..
- We will deliver a Sustainable SEND Service and System.

As a partnership, we guarantee that we will:

In Dudley we will strive to:

- Plan and work together to ensure we have a more joined up approach.

SEND Strategy Measures of Success

We will have a set of agreed measures that we will track and monitor over the period of the strategy and we will update you regularly on our progress.

- These measures will include:
 - education outcome and attainment across all key stages
 - exclusion rates
 - absence rates
 - NEET (Not in Education Employment or Training) figures
- Additionally an annual report will be provided reflecting on progress during the previous year and how the strategy will be taken forward in the following year.
